SECURITY TIPS

ELDER FRAUD & FINANCIAL EXPLOITATION

Criminals have gotten increasingly savvy in their ways of conning seniors out of their hard-earned money. It's important to remember that government agencies and most companies will typically not contact you for your personal information without you knowing about it beforehand. By staying vigilant, knowing what to look for, you can prevent yourself and loved ones from being taken advantage of.

Top 5 Scams Targeting Seniors?

- Health care & Medicare-Scammer will call as health care or Medicare representative to gain access to seniors' personal or contact information.
- Grandchild-Fraudster will say something like: "Hi, Grandma. Do you know who this is?" When the unsuspecting grandparent guesses a name of a grandchild the scammer has now established a fake identity. They'll know just enough information they get from Facebook, and other social media sites, such as where grandchild lives, where they vacation, or other personal details, and use this information to build trust. Once they establish a relationship, they ask for money.
- Phishing-The use of fake emails or websites appearing to be real in an attempt to steal personal information. A fraudster will send an email looking almost identical to a government agency, requesting personal information like Social Security numbers and bank account information. The IRS stresses it never initiates contact with taxpayers via email about their accounts. If you see an email from the IRS, or any company or agency requesting your personal information, delete it immediately and definitely **DO NOT CLICK ON ANY WEBSITE LINKS.**
- Prescription drugs-With the rising costs of some prescription drugs, senior citizens are going online to look for less expensive drugs. These drugs can be counterfeit, making this scam extremely dangerous. Fraudsters will simply take the money without the delivery of the expected and paid for medicines.
- Tech support-Using scare tactics, the scammer urgently claims that he has detected a virus or something wrong with your computer. The caller may even ask to take over the personal computer remotely to install software that allows him to assist. Once the scammer takes over the computer, all personal information on the computer is inaccessible to the senior, and can be used for malicious things by the scammer. They can also render the computer unusable. Scammer inevitably asks for payment of several hundred dollars via credit card or online payment.
